## **MAKING MYELOMA MATTER**

Myeloma Canada is the only national charitable organization created by, and for, Canadians impacted by multiple myeloma. The organization is driven to improve the lives of those affected by myeloma by empowering the community through awareness, education and advocacy programs, and supporting clinical research to find a cure. Since it was founded in 2005, Myeloma Canada has been making myeloma matter.

#### **Our mission :**

To improve the lives of Canadians impacted by myeloma through awareness-building, educational efforts, advocacy, fostering an empowered myeloma community and support of clinical research so that a cure may be found.

## A message from our Executive Director

When I look back at 2021, it's with a mix of emotions ranging from awe, frustration and anger to tremendous gratitude, hope and optimism. It's been a seesaw of clarity and confusion, of highs and lows and in-betweens. We made it through the second year of living in a world-wide pandemic, of Delta and Omicron variants, double vaccinations and booster shots, loosening and re-introduction of restrictions on in-person gatherings, fluctuating opening and closing of borders, the introduction of vaccine passports, all the while adapting to our new norm of Covid-19 testing, physical distancing, masking up, etc.

Our world has become smaller yet ironically, more accessible through technologies like Zoom. Fundamental human rights issues regarding equity, inclusivity, diversity, and advocacy came out of the shadows and shared centre stage with the pandemic. Never have communities come together to achieve so much.

It's never been more essential to establish and maintain positive, supportive relationships, reach out and not be afraid to ask or accept help from your healthcare provider, family, friend or other support network(s). The increasing demands on our time and energy, coupled with the continued stress of living within a pandemic can play havoc on all of us.

The power to persevere, to self-advocate for the most appropriate treatments and the best care is how we can achieve the best life for the myeloma community. The more we talk about myeloma, educate our fellow Canadians, the more people will come to understand the disease, recognize the myriad of symptoms that are too often brushed under the guise of something



innocuous or benign. The more awareness that's created for myeloma, the quicker people will be diagnosed and treated.

We did face some challenges with regards to new treatment funding and availability in Canada; the first Health Canada approved CAR T-cell immunotherapy for myeloma was not recommended for reimbursement by the provinces, and the pricing negotiations between manufacturers and the government agency for therapies such as daratumumab (Darzalex) in the sub-cutaneous formulation, and the newest CD38 monoclonal antibody, isatuxumab (Sarclisa), are not yet complete. But the good news is, the technology exists, and we foresee 2022 as being a very busy year for drug advocacy.

Regardless of the few bumps in the road we faced along the way, your dedication to making myeloma matter as a community is the reason why 2021 was an exceptional year for Myeloma Canada. We soared to new heights and exceeded even our own expectations in our programming, research investments and fundraising as a direct result of you, your passion, commitment, and support.

If I may ride the tailcoat of our 2021 theme, you proved to yourselves – and the entire Canadian myeloma community – that YOU most certainly have the POWER to improve the lives of thousands living with this disease.

## Education

DEVELOP, SUPPORT AND DISSEMINATE NECESSARY INFORMATION AND RESOURCES TO HELP OUR MYELOMA COMMUNITY MAKE INFORMED DECISIONS ABOUT THEIR HEALTHCARE.

Each year, Myeloma Canada hosts dozens of events, information sessions and webinars to stay connected with the Canadian myeloma community. 2021 continued to be challenging year; we didn't let the cloud of COVID-19 get the better of us, once again, we adapted our programs to the realities of the pandemic and even worked on new projects for 2022. Since we were still unable to meet in-person for educational events, we provided new online InfoVideos and InfoWebinars throughout the year, developed new factual InfoSheets, and created more educational InfoGuides to support patients and their caregivers throughout their journey. For example, when the generic versions of Revlimid (lenalidomide) were approved for use in Canada, we promptly developed an InfoSheet on generics, and disseminated the information and its implications to the community. Our online platforms also made sure to capture all relevant information regarding the ever-evolving COVID-19 pandemic and was updated ongoingly, and as quickly as the news became available.

We are constantly striving to develop new tools with which to inform patients and their loved ones to help them better understand the challenges they face, and 2021 was no exception. We ensure that our community has the tools they need to better understand and manage their lives with myeloma, regardless of where they may be in their journey.





## Access & Advocacy

#### ADVOCATE FOR ACCESS TO THE BEST TREATMENTS AND SUPPORT SERVICES FOR PEOPLE LIVING WITH MYELOMA.

In 2021, we had the opportunity to speak out on important issues by being invited to take part in several public consultations organized by Health Canada regarding a brand-new strategy for funding rare disease treatments, as well as changes to the regulatory framework for clinical trials in Canada. Through different partnerships with the Coalition Priorité Cancer and the Patient Advisory Committee of CATALIS Quebec, we were able to advocate for modifications to the current regulatory framework that limits access to clinical trials in Quebec, and influence clinical research priorities in the province. These discussions involved members of various organizations like ours, along with health professionals, researchers, and members of government bodies. It was a great opportunity to raise awareness for the issues our community are facing.

With the arrival of generic versions of lenalidomide and negative funding recommendations for certain treatments – such as the case for CAR T-cell immunotherapy and other cancer drugs – we vow to continue doing all we can to advocate on behalf of the myeloma community. Throughout the year, we saw many manufacturers go full speed ahead with requests to enter the market with new drugs or treatment combinations for multiple myeloma. By sharing your stories with us, you enabled us to continue our mission and helped us built strong submissions for drug access.

With regards to the COVID-19 pandemic situation, Myeloma Canada joined forces with support groups and many of our partners to ensure that cancer and immunocompromised individuals were granted accelerated access to COVID-19 vaccinations. We participated in consultations with the World Health Organization (WHO) and Canada's National Advisory Committee on Immunization (NACI), to whom we provided feedback and submitted a brief on process and framework modernization.

The work we do to keep our seat at the negotiating table is crucial; it ensures that the voices of our myeloma community members are heard, and that the healthcare system responds to your needs.

## **Highlights**

- Succeeded in getting support for accelerated access to COVID-19 vaccines for myeloma patients in no less than 5 Canadian provinces
- Created a national advocacy campaign to make healthcare a priority during the federal election (in partnership with CONECTed and several Canadian patient organizations)
- Isatuximab (Sarclisa, for injection) with pomalidomide (Pomalyst) and dexamethasone was officially recommended for reimbursement (although not yet funded)
- New generic versions of lenalidomide capsules commonly known as Revlimid were approved
- Myeloma Awareness Day and Myeloma Awareness Month proclaimed in 4 Canadian provinces
- Developed the "Declaration of Personal Health Data Rights in Canada" with a patient and caregiver-led Data Working Group, at the Patients Redefining the Future of Healthcare in Canada Summit



## 2021 Myeloma Canada community awards

Recognizing the exceptional leadership of our Canadian myeloma community.



#### Executive Director's Leadership Award

#### Erin Belzile – North Bay, ON

Erin is a strong advocate for better access to procedures and healthcare for those living in remote communities, featuring in a Patient Family and Caregiver Council (PFCC) video on a patient's perspective of the challenges within the healthcare system, which was for presentation to the Ontario Health Team (OHT). Erin also participated in a Myeloma Canada panel discussion on the issues and challenges for patients living in remote areas. Erin created a team and started her own virtual walk, raising \$14,700 for her first year and sharing their story several times in local media. Erin decided to fill the volunteer Group Leader position in the Nipissing Support Group.



#### Carolyn Henry Memorial TEAM Award

#### Alyssa Dickey - Patient advocacy - Etobicoke, ON

In 2021, Alyssa launched her blog, Myeloma in the Middle to raise awareness for myeloma and create an online community for younger folks living with the disease. Alyssa joined the Steering Committee for Health eMatters, Myeloma Canada's exciting new program and conference for online Canadian cancer advocates. She also works as a Peer Support volunteer for Myeloma Canada's Peer Support Program, giving younger Canadian adults with myeloma somewhere to turn to.

#### Phil Harbridge - Health policy advocacy - Surrey, BC

Phil is a valued member of Myeloma Canada's Patient Advisory Council (PAC) for Western Canada (and its Vice Chair). He was instrumental in advocating and accelerating 2nd dose vaccinations for myeloma patients in BC. ## **Patient Advisory Council (PAC)**

#### A message from the PAC Chair

In 2014, Myeloma Canada's Board of Directors created the Patient Advisory Council (PAC). The Council's primary objective was, and continues to be, to advise the Board of Directors on important issues for patients, caregivers, and support groups, while providing the patient perspective on national and regional issues. The PAC also works closely with the Myeloma Canada professional team to provide patient-focussed advice and feedback on the organization's many activities.

Highlights of PAC initiatives and activities in 2021 include:

- Creating and submitting of reports to the Board of Directors for each Board meeting that summarized recent and planned activities of the PAC. These reports also included comments and recommendations on matters important to patients, caregivers, and Support Groups;
- Reviewing and updating of the PAC terms of Reference;
- Holding a Blue Sky Meeting to focus on the PAC role and activities. The top 5 initiatives were: continue organizing Support Group Leader Summits; expansion of Myeloma Awareness Day; increased support to Support Group Leaders; increased support around Covid-19; and increased focus on education and social perspectives for patients and caregivers;
- Building relationships with Support Group Leaders in each region of Canada, regularly meeting through conference and Zoom calls;
- Providing suggestions for Myeloma Canada's response to COVID-19, offering advice for myeloma patients and their families;

- Advocating for third doses of COVID vaccines for immunocompromised patients, and for a shortened timeline between doses (as per manufacturer's recommended guidelines);
- Providing advice and feedback on various documents including:
- the Declaration of Personal Health Data Rights in Canada;
- the Guidelines to Establish Proclamations, the templates and the sample Proclamations for Myeloma Awareness Month;
- the Myeloma Canada Advocacy Handbook.
- Helpingin planning, and presenting an update on the PAC, at the Support Group Leaders Virtual Summit;
- Holding an orientation session for the two new PAC representatives from Ontario;
- Participating, as observers, in the Myeloma Education sessions entitled "Identifying Best Practices in the Diagnosis and Management of Myeloma";
- Most PAC members participated in other Myeloma Canada initiatives and committees, and had leadership roles in the Multiple Myeloma Marches;
- Continually improving some PAC internal practices, to enhance our effectiveness.

The PAC is committed to the well-being of the Canadian myeloma community. We will continue to focus on embedding the patient perspective in all Myeloma Canada activities.

## Science and research

#### FOSTER, SUPPORT, AND FUND MYELOMA-RELATED RESEARCH THAT LEADS TO BETTER PATIENT OUTCOMES AND LEADS TO A CURE.

Myeloma research is rapidly advancing. The past two years have been exciting ones for myeloma innovation in Canada, and thanks to your generous investments, Myeloma Canada continues to be a catalyst to it all. Your contributions have enabled us to invest over 1.2 million dollars over two years in many important research initiatives, all right here in Canada!

In 2021, along with continued investments in the Myeloma Research Priority Setting Partnership (PSP) and other exciting research projects, Myeloma Canada, once again, allocated significant research dollars to the Canadian Myeloma Research Group (CMRG), a not-for-profit research organization that has common goals with Myeloma Canada. In 2021, Myeloma Canada contributed a total of \$300,000 to CMRG's research activities including made-in-Canada clinical trials and the National Myeloma Database platform.

Furthermore, supporting myeloma research initiatives that are focused on improving quality of life, and helping to find a cure remains our top priority. Collaboration, investment, and determination are at the forefront of change. Myeloma Canada supported research projects in the development of redefining risk stratification and genetic profiling, understanding the disparities that people living with myeloma face and why certain immunotherapies are ineffective for myeloma, and supporting our international leaders in allogeneic stem cell transplant research.

Amongst our proudest accomplishments, was the publishing of the results of the Myeloma Research Priority Setting Partnership (PSP) initiative in the peer-reviewed British Journal of Haematology in November 2021. The paper, which documents the process and Top 10 priority questions for future multiple myeloma research, is publicly available for use on an international scale. A first of its kind globally, the PSP was a 4-phase project initiated in the fall of 2019. The goal of the project was to determine the top 10 unanswered myeloma research questions defined by you, our community, under the James Lind Alliance Priority Setting Partnership process. Our objective in supporting this important initiative was to guide Myeloma Canada's future research investments toward projects that are meaningful to our community. We're excited and proud to put these research questions into action on your behalf!

- Supporting contributing factors that impact quality of life and overall survival in myeloma
- Investing in unlocking mechanisms of drug resistance
- Supporting our international leaders in allogeneic stem cell transplant research
- Conducting the first Myeloma Priority Setting Partnership (PSP) to identify the top myeloma research priorities

Projects in which we invested in 2021 identified and addressed knowledge gaps in the diagnosis, treatment and science of myeloma and related plasma cell disorders, with the goal of improving quality of life and ultimately, finding a cure.




